

Introduction

Service-Enriched Housing (SEH) is affordable and accessible housing that integrates a robust menu of social services and other supports into its daily operations to promote stability in the lives of vulnerable residents. SEH could include rental or ownership homes and may feature healthy housing and universal design standards. By offering a wide array of services, SEH providers support diverse low and moderate-income families and individuals ranging from the fragile elderly living alone to disabled veterans to those experiencing homelessness, allowing them to live with dignity and achieve optimal self-sufficiency.

LISC San Antonio requested that Community Information Now (CI:Now), a nonprofit local data intermediary, characterize and quantify – within the limitations of available data and budget – key vulnerable populations in San Antonio who would benefit from SEH. Grounded in the evidence base and the Mayor’s Housing Policy Task Force’s *Housing Policy Framework and Housing for All*, including the Special Populations Technical Working Group’s report, this document attempts to build a foundation from which the need for specific types of service-enriched housing can be better understood and quantified.

Estimates and Data Sources

Table 1 on the following pages identifies a wide array of vulnerable populations likely to benefit from service-enriched housing (SEH). Drawing from the most reliable and current data available either publicly or via reasonable request, the table includes the estimated size of each population in Bexar County, with margin of error (where applicable, abbreviated “MOE”) in parentheses. Population overlaps and issue co-morbidities are identified where data were available. Indicators marked with an asterisk are featured in the companion infographic datasheet. It is important to note that:

- these estimates are a compilation of point in time counts of Bexar County *residents with characteristics that indicate needs consistent with service-enriched or supportive housing, not residents who live in or are seeking service-enriched housing*; and
- the estimates *do not imply that all members of a population would benefit from the same suite of services*. None of these populations is homogenous. Individual and family needs, abilities, and strengths vary greatly within any population.

Data sources and years are listed in Table 2. Sources are hyperlinked in cases where the data is available online.
