Building Hope Texas engaged Ampersand Education, a leading education policy and growth firm, to conduct a landscape assessment of the demographics, school ecosystem, and overall market charters face in San Antonio and Houston.



With the support of Colliers, we've curated and presented a picture of the landscape to help current and aspiring charter school leaders make informed school siting and planning decisions.

Executive Summary

San Antonio, Texas, is the fastest growing city in the country, with a unique educational landscape on its hands: poor existing schools across 17 districts abound, while new schools are needed to meet the city's growing population. The combination of these factors has led to a rapid increase (from 2% to 8% of the market) of charter school growth over the last seven years. That said, opportunities exists across the city, specifically within the 1604 loop.

We set out to capture the landscape of San Antonio in order to better assess where current failing schools exist, with the goal of identifying areas for future growth – all while understanding the cost of real estate in those areas. What follows is a zone-by-zone look of our community; one that underscores the need for more high-quality charter schools, but creating and finding opportunities that will ensure success regardless of the school model, facility needs, or ultimate growth plan.






San Antonio is located in Bexar County in south-central Texas. Bexar County is home to more than 350,000 elementary and secondary students.

Within San Antonio, there are two major highways that encompass the city, 1604 and 410, shown on the map to the left. The children living within 1604 and 410 account for 77% and 36% of the children living in Bexar County, respectively.








Bexar County Growth

The growth of population under age 18 has not kept pace.


In 2000, individuals under age 18 comprised 28.5% of the population; in 2017, they made up just 26.1% of the population, a decline of 2.4 percentage points.






Bexar County Enrollment Trends


Since 2011, charter school enrollment has grown from 2 percent of county-wide public school enrollment to 8 percent, while total public school enrollment has grown by 30,000 students.





Race and Ethnicity Over Time








Methodology

Eight Zones



Given that the majority of students live within 1604, we created 8 zones within both loops to help study the landscape.

We will study the demographics in each zone, the forecasted growth of school age students, and examine the current schools in each zone.



Methodology

We used multiple sources to aggregate data about San Antonio overall and for each zone, including Esri, the American Community Survey, TEA, and local district and charter websites. We used ArcGIS as our geospatial analysis tool.

Building Hope partnered with Colliers International to provide all data related to facility and land costs. For each zone, we sought the following publicly available data:

- Socioeconomic status
- Racial and ethnic composition
- Performance of current schools
- Charter schools located in the area
- Average teacher salary
- Facility and land costs






- Excluding Alamo Heights and the Military Base, most district schools are low performing.
- The western part of the zone is served by strong charter schools with KIPP and Great Hearts.
- Because of the low population growth in this area, there is not much of a remaining charter market in this zone outside of the northwest corner serving Northeast ISD.






Zone 2 – Key Takeaways

- There is moderate growth with a large low-income population, and strong potential for new schools.










- There is low population growth spread over several smaller districts, and IDEA is the only CMO serving this zone.

- This zone does have high poverty and concentration of failing district schools.








- There is a large charter presence in this zone and on the edges of bordering zones, but there could be a need for high performing high school as most charters are serving primary school students.










- This is the highest performing zone for district schools and includes several high performing charters, but there is demand for more schools due to recent growth.
- This zone has a diverse student population and high median household income, with potential for a diverse-by-design or a unique model operator.










- This zone has the largest population growth but the smallest raw population.

- Charters just north of the zone can potentially pull students from this area.






Recommendations

While each zone has its own unique potential, there are two that stand out:

Zone 2: the southern portion of this zone has a high-needs population that is currently being underserved, in one of the most affordable areas for facilities.

In addition, its proximity to Zone 3 would allow for access a greater population of students, and for the right operator, potentially in partnership with the military base.

Zone 4: in an area with the second largest raw number of students – and those of the highest need – in the city, this zone lacks enough high-quality schools, and high schools, in particular. Being adjacent to **Zone 8**, currently home to the largest number of students and the cheapest land in the greater San Antonio region, make this a highly attractive part of town.






Share of Households in Poverty







Growth in School Age Population


Percent Growth in School Age Children, 2018 to 2023 (Ages 5-17)









Race and Ethnicity: Hispanic Population











Race and Ethnicity: Black Population
