



Between 2000 and 2020 the population of OST/South Union decreased by 3%. The number of residents under the age of 18 had the largest decline, at 23%.



Employment By Sector









Percent of People with Health Insurance by Census Tract, 2020





Adults in OST/South Union have higher rates of diabetes, high blood pressure and cholestrol, obesity and stroke than those in Harris County.







Vacant Housing Units by Census Tract







Home Ownership by Census Tract







In 2020, 64% of all renters and 30% of owners spent more than 30% of their household income on housing.











METRO Next BOOST Corridors include the 54 Scott Route between the Downtown Transit Center and MLK Health Center. Just over half of area streets have sidewalks. Between 2015 and 2019 there have been 138 accidents involving pedestrians and cyclists, six pedestrians and one cyclist have been killed. Community stakeholders have advocated for a safe crossing to MacGregor Park across Griggs.
